



PROGRAMS & STAFF FUNDED PRIMARILY BY EP&O:*


- Athletics

- Field trips
- Summer school
- Facility use
- Zero hour classes
- Increased mental health support
- Elementary art and STEM

There is a funding gap between what the state provides for education & the cost to operate the Tahoma School District. Local levy dollars help fill the gap.

2019 King County EP&O \$ per student



Tahoma receives fewer levy dollars per student than surrounding school districts.

PROGRAMS & STAFF SUPPLEMENTED BY EP&O:*

- School nurses
- Paraeducators, teaching assistants
- Counselors/social workers
- Reading and math assistance programs
- Elective classes/ 8-period day at THS
- Safety and security
- Food service
- Transportation
- Materials and supplies
- Special Education
- Teachers

*The existing EP&O levy will expire in 2020.

HOW MUCH WILL IT COST? HOMEOWNERS WOULD PAY ABOUT 50 CENTS MORE IF THE REPLACEMENT LEVY IS APPROVED, FOR A TOTAL OF \$2 PER \$1,000 ASSESSED VALUE

So, the owner of a \$500,000 home would pay about \$250 more per year than the current amount.
